


BALL-GOWN VALANCE

A short valance of satin-faced silk pulled into pencil pleats looks like a party dress. It adds a touch of elegance to Martha's sitting room (left) without hiding the window's frame. The color of the lustrous fabric is a close match to that of the paint on the wall, so the valance blends into its setting. Its appearance belies how easy it is to make: Just sew pencil-pleating tape, found at sewing stores, to the back of the fabric, and tug the strings in the tape to form the pleats.

PIQUE PELMET

The term *pelmet* refers to a short, structured valance (opposite), as well as to a more rigid construction, like a cornice. Here, the opaque white piqué pelmet visually anchors floaty dottedswiss sheers. Its design echoes the detailing on the bed's canopy.
